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## From the Headmaster

*The learning curve*

Last spring I was turning the water back on in a summer cottage when I found the “dreaded drip” as I checked the crawl space for leaks. I must not have gotten all of the water out of the line when I drained the lines in the fall, and something broke when the water froze during the winter. Tearing a panel off a wall exposed the problem – a pinhole leak right at a tee. A quick trip to ACE Hardware for a tee and the old propane torch and we were back in service in no time.

The ability to make that fix came from lessons learned the hard way. I remember years before taking on the job of replumbing an old farm house. I had watched plumbers sweat copper joints and I knew that I could do that – no problem. So with a couple of friends, some pipe cutters and a box of fittings we attacked the job. We cut out the old iron pipe and started back through with the shiny new copper. Wow, did all that new copper look great! Then at the end of an exhausting day the moment of truth – time to turn the water back on. As the water began to fill the system there were shrieks from everywhere. I think we counted 21 leaks. What had gone wrong? As it turned out there was one small step in the plumbing process that I had not taken into account. I had carefully done everything the plumbers had done except thoroughly clean each joint with a wire brush. I learned the hard way how important that little step could be.

# Passing the Buck

*Phil Buck looks to the future as he hires his daughter to teach*

As time passes, Headmaster Philip Buck is focusing more and more on who will take over the school when he and Principal Eileen Clark retire -- sometime in the next 10 years.

"It's critical to focus on how we are going to hand the school off to the next generation," he says. "That is more and more what I look for-- to try to get that next generation involved in the school." That's what is so perfect about having his daughter, Monica Buck, on the staff this year -- teaching middle school science and physical education.

Monica graduated from The Lamb of God School in 1999, and went on to Mt. de Sales Academy and then Franciscan University of Steubenville where she graduated in 2007 with a biology major. She worked for a lab in Washington D.C. for two years doing contract work for the Army but tired of the tedium of the job and the long commute. After a short stint selling insurance, her father approached her with the need for a science teacher at The Lamb of God School.

"I thought she might be interested," Mr. Buck says. "On the one hand, she's

not going to get rich working here ... but on the other hand, it's a great place to work, so I threw it out there."

"I definitely was interested," Monica responds. "I'm not sure what career I would enjoy so I thought I'd give it a try. It's going great so far. The kids are fun."

Mr. Buck realizes that his daughter may not be here to stay -- especially since she was recently engaged -- but he likes the idea of getting the next generation involved in the school even for just a short period of time. It is his hope that they will come back later.

"It's not just my kids but any of the next generation of parents," he says. While this generation is getting married and having families now -- he hopes they will consider coming back to teach when their kids are older. This is what happened with many of the present teachers, such as Mrs. Hart, Mrs. Hancock, Mrs. Sawyer, Mrs. Horne and Mrs. Boffen to name a few.

"They all had kids in the school in the past and now have time for teaching. They have the heart for the school. They know the school. "

Mr. Buck's biggest concern is keeping the spirit of the school intact.

"It's easier if folks have grown up with our..." he hesitates, looking for the right word and Monica quickly fills in the blank. "Charism," she finishes.

"Yes! They can naturally impart that," Mr. Buck says. "Not that we can do this all the time, but it certainly is a plus if we can find someone who is already flowing in that charism."

Many of the current teachers have been here a long time, so it's inevitable that there are going to be changes over the next 10 years.

"It's going to be critical to get the right people who appreciate and will maintain that charism," Mr. Buck says.

"And someone who won't be freaked out by the lizards," Monica adds with a laugh, referring to her father's collection of lizards and toads at the school.

Monica loved The Lamb of God School when she was a student here.

"I had a great time. When I talk to people who didn't go here, they talk about how terrible middle school was and how much they loved high school, but I had the opposite experience. This was my favorite place."

"It's what I grew up with. It's great," she says. "There is support and encouragement and the ability to share my faith."

And then there's the fact that she gets to see her dad every day. That's a bonus since they don't see each other much otherwise and neither likes talking on the phone.

"I love working with him. He's obviously the headmaster, he taught me when I was here, he coached me in high school. I'm really comfortable having him around," she says.
